Anti- Bullying Guidance for Parents and Carers

This guidance was created by the East Belfast Area Learning Community pastoral development group in line with Addressing Bullying inn Schools Act (NI) 2016 and DENI guidance.

Defining Bullying

"Bullying" includes (but is not limited to) the repeated use of—
(a)any verbal, written or electronic communication,
(b)any other act, or
(c)any combination of those,

by a pupil or a group of pupils against another pupil or group of pupils, with the intention of causing physical or emotional harm to that pupil or group of pupils.

Bullying is a form of unacceptable behaviour, but not all unacceptable behaviour can be considered bullying. Bullying usually has three key elements:

- It is usually repeated behaviour that happens over a period of time
- It usually involves an imbalance of power
- It is intentionally hurtful behaviour

Bullying is not:

- a disagreement or 'falling-out'
- a one-off argument
- someone being 'nasty' through an ill thought through word or action
- a 'relationship' issue where pupils just need to be helped to learn how to get along better

Socially unacceptable behaviours only become bullying behaviours when the behaviour meets the legal definition.

All unacceptable behaviour must be challenged, whether it is bullying or not and will be dealt with in line with the Positive Behaviour Policy.

Encouraging Young People to Report Bullying

Bullying is a secret, insidious form of behaviour and targets of bullying often fear that reporting it will make the situation worse. If a young person feels he/she is being bullied it must be taken seriously by staff and parents.

Within the school diary, advice is offered to young people who are anxious or worried. The advice is to talk to a trusted adult. Young people are reminded to report bullying to Base Teachers, Class Teachers, Classroom Assistants, Deputy/Designated Teachers and Principal.

Anti-bullying posters are on display around school. Counselling is also offered as well as useful websites such as Childline and the Samaritans. We mark Anti Bullying Week every year and throughout the year, assemblies which address the different types of discrimination. The message is always clear, that bullying is not tolerated and must be reported. Young people are advised not to delete cyber bullying remarks but to keep them as evidence. It is recommended that you as a parent monitor your child's social media use in order to safeguard your child from potential harm or risk.

It is strongly advised that parents make early contact with the school to discuss any matters which might have a bearing on the student's education.

Responding to a Bullying Concern

Staff, students and parents have a shared responsibility to have a proactive attitude to bullying. Prevention is as important as the action taken to address reports of bullying. Through assemblies, base classes and within the curriculum the issue of bullying and what to do about it should be continually emphasised.

The preventative curriculum for each year group includes work to help students improve their self-esteem and social skills and to encourage them to have the self-confidence to reject bullying behaviour from other people.

We expect the parents of young people who have been displaying bullying type behaviours to support school in their application of our policy. Parents should reinforce the message at home that bullying is morally wrong and potentially damaging.

It is important to understand that sometimes a parent's perception of a situation can be one sided and dependent on the young person's subjective perspective. In cases of alleged bullying it is important to be open minded as often there is a complicated build-up of events and 'tit for tat' behaviour. Young people who display bullying behaviour will often dismiss this as 'banter or messing about'.

All adults in school play a vital part as role models as reflected in their dealings with each other and their treatment of the young people. Staff who come in contact with young people are trained to watch for signs of bullying and report them to appropriate staff.

Helping your child with regard to bullying

Parents are essential in building up their child's self-esteem resilience, as confident young people are rarely bullied. Teach your child to say no to bullies and to walk away from potentially threatening situations.

Parents or carers should never ignore a report of bullying:

- Encourage your child to communicate his/her feelings
- Try not to overreact and do not display anger as it may silence your child
- Inform and co-operate with school in relation to a bullying concern
- Remain calm and try to get all the facts
- Take any threats of suicide and pleas of desperation very seriously
- Access help for your child through his/her GP

How a Parent or Carer can contact the School

If the bullying is occurring at school, contact your child's Base Teacher. If you are seriously concerned, make an appointment. Give the Base Teacher time to investigate and follow up, and he/she will inform you of what action has taken place.
